NROs rue shifting of NIS from Odisha

Bhubaneswar: The step-motherly attitude of the Union Government has drawn flak from Non-Resident Odias for its decision to ignore the State while announcing setting up of National Institute of Sciences (NIS) by the Human Resource Development Department recently.

They have rued the fact that though the then HRD Minister Murli Manohar Joshi had announced that the University Grants Commission (UGC) had initiated steps to set up the NIS at Bhubaneswar besides Chennai, Allahabad, Kolkata and Pune, on December 9, 2003, the present government announced setting up of Indian Institute of Sciences for Education and Research (IISER), the rechristened NIS at Pune and Kolkata only. It is not important whether the IISER will be set up at Chennai or Allahabad as both the cities host two national institutes of repute like IIT and IIIT respectively, they mention.

Meanwhile, Odias with a strong sense of Odia pride have taken up the cudgels to rake up this issue and make it a movement to fight the injustice meted out to the State. In an open letter to the Prime Minister Manmohan Singh and Congress president Sonia Gandhi, they have raised some pertinent points.

They say that since there is no Central institute like IIM or IIT, people of Odisha were hopeful that NIS, if set up in Odisha, would have given some sense of pride to them. It does not have even a Central university, they lament. In this context, ignoring Odisha in case of NIS smacks of political consideration, they allege.

Though Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik has written a letter to the Prime Minister on the issue, till now no steps have been initiated to give justice to this backward state, they bemoan.

They point out that if every new Government at the Centre changes educational investment decisions made by the previous government, seemingly on the ground of lack of strength in the ruling party, it will be a big blow to the Indian democracy.

The also lament the fact that the system of proportional representation makes the smaller states like Odisha susceptible to such injustice and apathy. They have invoked the wisdom of statesmen like Sonia Gandhi and Arjun Singh to make sure that resources are fairly distributed across the country.

They have urged the Union Government to reconsider its decision and add Bhubaneswar in the list of NIS and regain its dignity and fairplay. It would definitely rescue Odisha from successive governments'neglect in the
